Sample Script

Intro

Welcome to our production process tutorial. We will cover everything you need to know about our production process. First let me ask you a question, will you be filming your own content? Or will you be filming it in our studio?

Option A - Recording My Own Content

Since you will be filming your own content and providing it to us, let me cover some of the file format and specs that you will need to know.

Option B - Filming at LightSpeed VT

Great, when you come to our studio to start filming, let me tell you a few things to best get you prepared.





Three Separate Video Files

- lesson_01_intro.mp4
- lesson_01_option_a.mp4
- lesson_01_option_b.mp4

These are suggested filename formats.

Note: Each video must be at least 7 seconds long. This ensures smooth playback and reliable transitions between interactive elements.



Storyboard

"Welcome to our production process tutorial. We will cover everything you need to know about our production process."



"First let me ask you a question. Will you be filming your own content? Or will you be filming it in our studio?"



TALENT: Pause and smile for at least 10 seconds. **DO NOT FADE OUT**

Why 10 Seconds?

LightSpeed VT will use the final 10 seconds of your video to create an infinite loop until the User makes a selection. Alternatively, you may choose to "pause" the video until a selection is made.
