

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seek re-election in 2024. Republicans Ron DeS and Chris Christie were among the high-profile opponents to drop out of the race early, leaving former governor Nikki Haley with the best chance of stealing the nomination from former President Donald Trump. Trump also faced opposition from the states of Colorado and Maine, both of which attempted to remove him from the ballot, citing the 14th Amendment's Insurrection Clause.

THE TRIALS OF TRUMP

Donald Trump became the first American president to be indicted

for state or federal crimes, racking up nearly 100 charges related to business fraud, election interference and the removal of classified documents from the White House. He was also later found guilty of two cases of defamation against E. Jean Carroll, the columnist who accused him of sexual assault in 2019. Trump lost both trials, with juries awarding Carroll a combined \$88 million.

FOX: THE NEXT GENERATION

Fox News founder Rupert Murdoch announced in September that he would retire from his two empires, broadcaster Fox Corp. and book and newspaper publisher News Corp. Lachlan Murdoch, son of the 93-year-old media baron, was named chairman of both companies. Murdoch's media holdings, spanning Australia, the United Kingdom and the U.S., have been subject to numerous scandals, including phone hacks and sexual assault allegations against former Fox News chair Roger Ailes.





THE GREAT PRETENDER

Congressman George Santos was charged with 23 federal crimes for fraudulent campaign fundraising. Santos had been under a microscope since running in the 2022 election, when it was discovered he had lied about much of his personal background. On November 1, the House voted to expel him—and failed—but fraud allegations led to his removal on December 1. Santos pleaded not guilty to all charges.

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INCOME FOR ALL

In recent years, local governments began experimenting with providing a guaranteed basic income for those in need. Results have been positive, and the idea continues to grow. In November, California launched a state-funded guaranteed income pilot program aimed at providing a minimum income to 300 former foster youth. New Jersey Representative Bonnie Watson Coleman also reintroduced the national Guaranteed Income Pilot Program Act to the House of Representatives.

DEADLY SPREE

In October, a 40-year-old man went on a shooting spree in Lewiston, Maine, that became the 10th deadliest in U.S. history—and the most tragic ever in the state. He opened fire in a local bowling alley during a youth event, then began a second shooting at a nearby bar. The manhunt for the shooter ended two days later when authorities found him dead in a tractor-trailer. Eighteen individuals were killed and 13 were injured.

BALLOON POPPED

A Chinese spy balloon spotted traveling southeast from Idaho to South Carolina was shot down in February by an air-to-air missile under the order of President Biden. An F-22 fighter jet carried out the order as soon as the balloon was safely over the Atlantic Ocean. Chinese officials insisted the balloon, which was said to be the size of three buses, was a civilian craft that had accidentally entered U.S. airspace.









FAREWELL

Rosalynn Carter, former first lady and wife of President Jimmy Carter for 77 years, championed women's rights, mental health and other noble causes. She died in November at the age of 96. Other honorable Americans who passed away in the past year include Justice Sandra Day O'Connor and former secretary of state Henry Kissinger.

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TAKING SIDES

On October 7, a Hamas-led Palestinian military launched a surprise missile and ground assault on southern Israel from the Gaza Strip, killing more than 1,000 people. The group claimed its attack was due to Israeli occupation of Palestinian territories. Israel declared a state of war, attacking Gaza and killing more than 28,000 Palestinians in its efforts to destroy Hamas. Protests and calls for a ceasefire have since taken place around the world.



ROYAL CANCER SCARE

Britain's newly crowned King Charles has been diagnosed with cancer and immediately began regular treatments. More than 20 million people watched Charles' televised coronation ceremony the previous May, which was estimated to have cost anywhere from 50 to 250 million pounds. Charles' wife, Camilla, was

member of NATO, bringing total membership in the international military alliance to 31. The country first applied for membership in 2022, though its aspiration to join dates back to the Soviet invasion from November 1939 to March 1940. Finnish public opinion for joining had been low but swung in favor following Russia's 2022

invasion of Ukraine.

PENSION PROTEST

More than a million French citizens took to the streets in March to protest President Emmanuel Macron's plan to raise the country's legal retirement age from 62 to 64. Labor unions walked off the job in protest, bringing much of the country to a standstill. Macron's plan was meant to address an estimated pension shortfall brought on by increased life expectancies. Previously, France's retirement age was raised from 60 in 2010.

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THE WAR CONTINUES

Russia's invasion of Ukraine continued. By August, the total number killed on both sides since the war began in 2022 had grown to nearly 500,000. In June, the private Russian military group Wagner staged a rebellion against Russia's Ministry of Defence, with the group's leader, Yevgeny Prigozhin, stating President Vladimir Putin's justifications for the war against Ukraine were false. Prigozhin and other Wagner leaders were killed in a plane crash two months later



COVID'S DOWNWARD TREND

In May, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared an end to the COVID-19 global health emergency. The organization stressed that the new status was not meant to imply the disease was no longer a threat, only that increased immunity and decreased death rates had put the pandemic on a downward trend. COVID-19 was first declared a global emergency by WHO in January 2020.

TUNNEL WORKERS FREED

Forty-one construction workers who became trapped in a collapsed mountain tunnel in India were freed after 17 days in November. The workers were pulled to safety through welded pipes the rescuers had been using to remove dirt and rocks from the tunnel. The tunnel collapsed when a landslide caused a portion to cave in 650 feet from the entrance.

CLIMATE CHANGES

According to the National Centers for Environmental Information, 2023 was the hottest year globally and fifth hottest year in the contiguous U.S. The average temperature was 2.4 degrees Fahrenheit warmer than the 20th-century average, with 35 states experiencing one of their top 10 hottest years to date. Some areas saw record-breaking rain and snowfall, resulting in severe storms



and flooding, while others experienced severe drought. The year also saw 28 individual billion-dollar climate- and weather-related disasters—the highest number in 44 years.

A QUAKE FOR THE AGES


A massive earthquake struck central Turkey and parts of Syria in February, which was quickly followed by a second quake of near equal magnitude. Damage was widespread, with more than three million left homeless and over 50,000 killed. It was the largest earthquake in Turkey since 1939 and the deadliest in the area since 526 CE.







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REBRAND TO THE MAX

Warner Brothers Discovery rebranded its streaming service in May, dropping the "HBO" from HBO Max. The company said the move was an attempt to give the service a more family-friendly vibe and showcase its broad range of content, which, along with HBO titles and shows from the Discovery Channel, includes 35,000 hours of programming.



STREAM-FLATION

Netflix, Disney+, Apple TV+ and Hulu all significantly raised their subscription prices in an attempt to increase revenues. In many cases, the streamers did away with previous ad-free plans and introduced new, cheaper plans alongside higher-priced tiers. Netflix and Disney also began cracking down on password sharing.



















SIGNING OFF

Throughout her 50-plus-year music career, Tina Turner entertained with a fiery energy that earned her the title the Queen of Rock 'n' Roll. She died in May at the age of 83. Other entertainers who passed away this year include Matthew Perry (Friends), Lisa Marie Presley (daughter of Elvis), Paul Reubens (Pee-wee Herman), Toby Keith (country singer), Carl Weathers (Rocky), Jimmy Buffet (singer-songwriter), John Romita (Spider-Man artist) and Cormac McCarthy (The Road).




Beginning in May, Hollywood's writers went on a labor strike that lasted 148 days. Their walkout was joined in July by a strike of Hollywood's actors, marking the first time since 1960 both unions had been at the picket line at the same time. Hot button issues included the prevention of artificial intelligence from replacing writers and actors, and improved compensation from streaming services. Film and television production ground to a halt, altering movie schedules and delaying the fall TV season. Agreements were reached with both unions by the end of 2023.



MICKEY MOUSE FOR ALL

Following two copyright law extensions that allowed the Walt Disney Company to retain exclusive rights to its signature mascot for an additional 40 years, 95-year-old Mickey Mouse's copyright protection finally expired in January, putting the earliest version of the character in the public domain. Anyone in the U.S. can now use the character without infringement, as evidenced by the trailer for a Mickey-themed horror movie that was quickly released upon expiration.

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VEGAS GETS GLITZIER

Sphere, a 366-foot-high, 18,600-seat auditorium featuring a 16K resolution wraparound screen, opened just outside the Las Vegas Strip in September. U2 kicked off the inaugural show with the first night of a planned 40-show residency. Sphere's exterior is also made of a wraparound screen, allowing it to be seen in various forms from afar. Built at a cost of \$2.3 billion, it's Vegas's most expensive building and the largest sphere structure in the world.

THE END

Surviving Beatles Paul McCartney and Ringo Starr released what was billed as the group's final song in November. "Now and Then," which featured tracks by late Beatles John Lennon and George Harrison, arrived 53 years after the group disbanded and 60 years after the band's famous Ed Sullivan Show appearance, which kicked off Beatlemania in America. Its video received eight million views on YouTube within two hours of release.



THE TAYLOR SWIFT

Taylor Swift's Eras Tour, which played 151 shows across five continents, became the highest grossing tour of all time, as well as the first to earn more than \$1 billion in revenue. The tour broke the previous U.S. record of most tickets sold in a single day (\$2.4 million) and the filmed version of the tour quickly became the highest-grossing concert film ever. Swift ended 2023 by breaking Elvis Presley's record for most weeks at number one by a solo artist on the Billboard 200 chart and began 2024 surpassing the record for the most Grammy Album of the Year wins.







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UNLIKELY COUPLE

When Barbie and Oppenheimer were released on the same day in July, they created a boxoffice phenomenon. "Barbenheimer" was the movie event of the year, as viewers flocked to see an unlikely double bill of stories based on a popular Mattel doll and the father of the atomic bomb, respectively. Both films were among the highest grossing films of 2023, earning a combined 21 Oscar nominations. Barbie's Greta Gerwig also became the first solo female to direct a billion-dollar movie.

STAR WARS BACK IN HYPERDRIVE

After several big-screen missteps that saw the Star Wars universe confined to the small screen for four years, the Disney-owned property finally announced a plan to return to theaters. One upcoming movie will focus on the popular

Mandalorian character and his ward, Grogu, while another will see the return of Rey, a lead from the sequel trilogy.

After 15 years of dominating the box office, Marvel suffered its firstever bomb, as The Marvels starring Brie Larson became the studio's

lowest-grossing film ever. Warner Bros. suffered an

equal fate when The Flash—a movie hyped for the return of Michael Keaton's Batman lost the studio \$200 million. Whether movie-goers were tired of watching spandex-clad heroes save the universe or their storylines ran out of steam was a topic of much debate.



HOLLYWOOD TURNS 100

It was a centennial year for several of Hollywood's biggest symbols, including the Hollywood sign. Originally a real-estate advertisement, Los Angeles' most famous icon was almost torn down in 1949 due to its state of disrepair but instead it was restored and declared a landmark. Two movie studios also turned 100 in 2023: Warner Bros. and Disney, the respective homes of Looney Tunes and Mickey Mouse.



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TWEET STORM


Elon Musk stepped down as Twitter's CEO in June, abiding by the results of a user poll showing ongoing discontent with his reign over the social media platform. Still, Musk continued making major decisions regarding Twitter's day-to-day operations—most notably, a complete rebranding of the platform as X. In the first year of Musk's ownership, X usership was down 15 percent, and the platform lost more than half its value.

MONTANA BANS TIKTOK

In May 2023, Montana became the first state to pass legislation banning the use of popular Chinese-based video app TikTok. The law was set to take effect in January but was blocked by a federal judge who claimed the ban likely violated First Amendment rights. By March 2024, the ban was still under appeal by the state. The federal government had already banned the app from all government-owned devices over worries that U.S. user information was being passed on to the Chinese government.

SETBACKS IN SPACE

SpaceX's Starship rocket exploded eight minutes into a November test flight that was to see it partially circle the globe and ditch into the Pacific Ocean. Despite the setback, the test was deemed more successful than an initial test undertaken the previous April. The 400-foot rocket is the largest ever built and is expected to fly NASA astronauts to the moon by 2026 and, eventually, to Mars. A third test was planned for March 2024.







AI FEARS

Artificial intelligence (AI) went mainstream in 2023 with the release of GPT-4, a language model created by OpenAI that can generate text similar to human speech in ways far superior to any previous software. Fear surrounding the possibilities of AI being detrimental to humanity was one of the rumored reasons OpenAI removed co-founder and CEO Sam Altman from the company in November. However, a staff revolt (and a job offer to Altman from Microsoft) led to his reinstatement days later.

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Lionel Messi, one of the greatest soccer players of all time, signed to the MLS soccer league's Inter Miami team in July, bringing him to the United States after a long career in Europe. Messi was the longtime leader of Argentina's national football team, winning the World Cup with them in 2022, while also personally being awarded the adidas Golden Ball for the FIFA World Cup for a record-

setting second time.



In June, the PGA Tour announced it would merge with LIV Golf, a Saudi-backed upstart with a more laid-back approach than the long-established PGA. LIV Golf was founded in 2021 and quickly began luring players away from the PGA, causing a major divide in the golf world. Many players said they felt betrayed by the merger.



RECORD BREAKER


Lakers forward LeBron James broke the all-time NBA scoring record in February. His career total at the time was 38,388, breaking the previous record set in 1984 by Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, who was on hand to witness the passing of the torch. James has since passed the 39,000 mark and is well on his way to 40,000.

FAREWELL

Dick Butkus was not only a strong linebacker for the Chicago Bears, but an accomplished sports commentator and actor. He died in October at the age of 80. Other athletes who passed away this year include MLB all-star Joe Pepitone, hockey legend Guy Lafleur, track-and-field athlete Tori Bowie and the first Jamaican WNBA player Simone Edwards.











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NEW LEAGUE DEBUT

The newly inaugurated, highly anticipated Professional Women's Hockey League played its first game in January. Toronto's rival team New York (teams in the new league were still unnamed) won the game 4-0, with Ella Shelton scoring the league's first-ever goal. The six-team league, which was established after the collapse of the Canadian Women's Hockey League in 2019, planned an initial 24-game season.

CANADA'S FIRST KING CUP

The Canadian women's tennis team won its first Billie Jean King Cup in November. Canada triumphed over Italy 2-0 in the final, with players Marina Stakusic and Leylah Annie Fernandez winning straightset singles events. Awarded since 1963, the Billie Jean King Cup is the premier international women's tennis team cup.



CANADA'S RETURN TO THE TOP

In August, Nick Taylor became the first golfer from Canada to win the Canadian Open in 69 years, beating Tommy Fleetwood on the fourth playoff hole. The last Canadian to win the Open was Pat Fletcher (who was actually born in England) in 1954. The only winner to previously win for Canada was Karl Keffer, who won in 1909 and 1914.

GO FOR GOLDA 24-year-old

AROP

runner from Edmonton, Marco Arop, was the first Canadian to win gold in the men's 800 metres at the World Athletics Championships in August. He spent the entire first of the two-lap race in last place but pulled ahead early in the final lap to secure victory. His time was 1:43:30—the third-best time in the world this year. FIBA SCORE

In September, Canada won its first-ever medal at the FIBA Men's Basketball World Cup. Team Canada beat the United States in the overtime bronze medal game, 127-118. Canada's Dillon Brooks scored 39 points alone—the most ever scored by a single player in a medal-winning FIBA competition.







ALOUETTES DOMINATE

The Montreal Alouettes won football's Grey Cup 28-24 in a November match against the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. Hosted at Tim Hortons field in Hamilton, it was the team's first Grey Cup win in 13 years.

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STAMPING OUT DISEASE

Six nations eliminated what the World Health Organization (WHO) refer to as "neglected tropical diseases" in 2023. The diseases in question usually affect those living in poverty, in countries with few resources. In the early 2000s, the WHO began a program to stamp out 21 such diseases, which affect more than a billion people worldwide.




ARE WE ALONE?

In a July congressional hearing on Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs), former air force officer David Grusch claimed the government was not only reverseengineering recovered air vessels, but had recovered non-human biological matter from UFO crash sites. Grusch further claimed the government has been aware of non-human activities since the 1930s.

BLACK HOLE IN THE SUN

In December, NASA released photos of a massive hole that had formed on the surface of the sun. The coronal hole was estimated to be the size of 60 Earths and are not considered uncommon, but they can interfere with radio signals. Thankfully, they are usually temporary.



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
